Like many crafters, my craft purchases somewhat outstrip my capacity to use my craft materials. No one in my house is concerned about this except me. My husband is a confirmed enabler outside of some occasional teasing.



And I probably wouldn't feel bad about it either except that I have a small, old house with very little closet space, and I've run out of blank walls to put shelves against. And I have a lot of creative hobbies, every one of which has a "stash" of materials at the ready. So you can probably imagine the perpetual fight against chaos that happens every time I need to wade in to make a birthday card or find that skein of yarn or fat quarter of fabric.

I know I'm not the only one who thinks about stash. In 2018, as a summer reading/knit-a-long our guild read *A Stash of One's Own* by Clara Parkes. If you haven't read it yet, I recommend downloading the audiobook from the library, it's fun to hear different perspectives on the subject from people in different parts of the knitting world (producers, designers, consumers). In 2019, we had a professional organizer as a guest speaker at one of our guild

meetings. I loved the discussion that day about how our guild members each organize their stash by different characteristics (weight? color? fiber?). And looking ahead to our August guild meeting, I'm looking forward to the planned panel discussion about stash.

In pondering this topic, and the prospect of putting a bunch of shelves in my attic for yarn bins, I found a few fun articles about stash that I want to share with you:

- 11 Types of Yarn You Probably Have in Your Stash Right Now This one spoke to me, because it acknowledged, as one of the types, the hand-medown/inherited yarn which comprises a large chunk of my own stash. My mom is always giving me yarn from her stash that she thinks I need more than her, and she has good taste, so I am usually powerless to resist. It also details ideas for using up other flavors of stash that people commonly have.
- Dr. Stashlove or: How I Learned to Stop Stashing and Use My Yarn I'm not anti-stash, as this article clearly is, but I did find the pictures and tone of the article quite funny. Maybe the sassy tone of this will kick-start those of you who are looking for motivation to pare down.
- This is for those of you on the "more is better" side of the fence. Take
 comfort that you are not alone. I adore this lady's unabashed love for her

- Or you might feel more like the Dowager Duchess of Grantham in this meme...





Roc Day/St. Distaff's Day marked the time when women would return to work after the December holidays, resuming their household duties including spinning. The name of this day isn't after an actual Saint but rather after the distaff: a tool used to wrap fiber around to keep it out of the way while spinning. This handy tool became the symbol of the importance of spinning during Medieval times when women of all classes even upper class took part.

Fiber Field Reports

There's a new *Knitting* game in town! I received this game as a Christmas gift and am looking forward to playing it. The cost was \$35.00 at a LYS. The creator is Lacey Ziemkiewicz from Monclova, OH which is approximately 20 minutes southwest of Toledo. Lacey funded her game through Kickstarter and posted the following description of herself.



"I am a fiber artist and new game designer who is also in the process of getting a degree in CAD technology. Oh yeah, and I LOVE table top gaming!"

Lacey continues: "This is my very first game. I've been working as a fiber artist for 11 years and it will always be my first love, but I've fallen hard for game design. Asking backers to put their trust in this first game will be my biggest challenge. This edition is just the beginning. I have plans to work directly with fiber artists to create custom expansion packs and collectors cards that will work seamlessly with the base game, but before I can get there I need to get the first edition off the ground. I'm planning on packaging this game in a box with room for extra cards to be added in the future. There are so many talented and fantastic fiber artists out there and I'm so excited to be able use this collaboration to celebrate our amazing, diverse, generous and artistic maker community."

Kudos to our fellow NCKG member Füsun Tuzcu for contributing and soliciting knitters to contribute to the world's largest blanket with the largest number of heart icons. Füsun received two certificates from the Guinness Book of World Records. One is for the largest handknit (non-crochet) blanket in the world and the other is for the blanket with the most heart icons in the world. Over 3,200 blankets measuring a minimum of one-metre by one-metre, knitted by 500 women belonging to 27 nationalities in record 18 months' time, were tacked together at an event to create a 3,150 square metre blanket with 5,279

hearts. The initiative was an effort to help underprivileged kids across the world. The blanket will dismantled and sent to orphanages around the world.
