SIGs – Exploring and Learning Together

We are starting a new SIG on <u>Elizabeth Zimmermann's Baby Surprise Sweater</u>. The jacket is knit in a single piece with just two seams that run across the shoulders and down the length of the sleeves. It includes extra ease across the back of the garment to fit well over a nappy (diaper). Commonly referred to as the "BSJ", the baby surprise jacket is "a very entertaining piece of knitted engineering."

We will meet on Monday, March 19, 2018 at the Orange Library, <u>31975 Chagrin</u> <u>Boulevard, Pepper Pike 44124</u>, in Meeting Room A, the Hope Room. We have the room from 5:30 pm to 8:45 pm. We'll start around 6:15 pm. All are invited to join this SIG.

Materials:

3 oz./85g of sport weight/dk yarn (6 sts to 1") or 8 oz./225g dk/worsted weight yarn (5 sts to 1"); 1 pr. needles in the size to give you either of these gauges; knitting notions including stitch markers.

The musical "Quilters" is a rich and heartwarming mosaic that captures the sweep and beauty, the fear and joy and the harsh reality and abundant rewards of 19th century frontier life. A pioneer mother and her six daughters illuminate the stories of their lives in various patches with music, dance and drama all the while creating a



beautiful quilt of human dignity and steadfastness in the face of adversity.

It is put on by The Rabbit Run Community Arts Association and performed at the C. K. Rickel Theatre, Royce Hall for the Fine and Performing Arts, Lake Erie College (off of Gillett St., Painesville, OH). There is an exhibit of quilts, felted sewn, woven, and knitted items, as well as old looms and a walking spinning wheel. The Western Reserve Spinners and Weavers Guild have many beautiful items in the exhibit and NCKG members, **Nancy Curtiss**, **Mo Doerner**, and **Nora Eason** have items on display.

NCKG member **Georgina Koh's** daughter, Evie Koh, is one of the daughters in the play. I enjoyed the show immensely and highly recommend it. It is a heartwarming, and at times, sad look at the lives of the pioneer women in the Western Reserve. Knitted Garment Competition Rules

- 1. All entries must be hand knitted and been completed since June 1, 2017. Entries must be clean, odor-free and in good condition.
- 2. An entry will only be accepted in one class. No more than two entries per class will be accepted from an individual.
- 3. All entries must be at least 50% wool from a sheep, except in the Knitter's Choice category.
- 4. Categories —
- K1 Sweaters and Vests
- K2 Shawls
- K3 Accessories hats, mittens, scarves, cowls, leggings, etc.
- K4 Socks and slippers
- K5 Garments for babies and children
- K6 Knitters Choice for non-wool knitted garments and/or garment category not listed
- 5. Entry Fee: \$3.00 per item.

We'll leave from the parking lot behind Orange Village Hall, at <u>4600 Lander</u> <u>Rd</u>. at 5:30. We'd love to have you join us!

<u>Bare Naked Wools</u> consist of 12 premium yarn lines that are all natural wool with no dyes. The shop also displays samples of Ann's beautiful designs. Many of you will remember Ann from the classes she taught for our guild a few years ago. It's suggested you either have an early dinner or bring something along to tide you over until 8:30 or so, when we'll head out to grab a bite at Mulligan's Pub on the way home. (Optional – this will be up to the drivers.)

LET THE SIGN-UPS BEGIN!

Registration for the Guild's annual retreat begins at the March meeting, March

13, 2018.

The retreat will be June 1-3, 2018 at <u>River's Edge</u> on Rocky River Drive with a day option for Saturday, June 2.

This is your last chance to enjoy a weekend away from home cares to relax and knit at River's Edge. After November, the peaceful spot will no longer be offering overnight accommodations, so if you always thought you would like to try the retreat, do so this year.

The cost is \$140 for the three days/two nights away. That covers a private room with shared bathroom, all meals from supper Friday through dinner Sunday at noon and the use of the parlors for knitting and friendly conversation. Saturday only is \$40 for two meals and the parlor use. There are opportunities for massage (I'll need to book those ahead--30, 60, 90 minutes) or yoga on Saturday morning which would be extra. Overnight reservations need to be made March through April. Reservations for Saturday only can be made up to the May Guild meeting on May 8. Make checks payable to North Coast Knitting Guild.

The facility is by the Metro Park for hiking and close to River Colors yarn shop and Blackbird Bakery (highly recommended!).
