## **Colorful Classes with Lorilee Beltman**

The first weekend in April treated Guild members to informative, creative, and very colorful classes from Lorilee Beltman. Some of us were able to enjoy all three classes, each interesting and color related, but it was worthwhile even if you could have only taken one. Lorilee said she loved teaching and it showed. She demonstrated the technique and then worked the room to make sure each student could do it. She was there to help and encourage and answered questions and concerns.

Saturday was an all day class called Colors that Climb (formerly Columns of Color), in which members learned how to add color vertically to pattern stitches. Like some of us, Lorilee had taken Susanna Hansson's class on the Rovaniemi Mittens. She liked the resulting climbing colors, but not the fiddly work to get it. Most of us left it at that, but she thought it through to figure out how she might also get the colorful result and came up with Colors that Climb. I liked the class and especially her suggestions for ways this technique could be worked with other patterns we might find or from a stitch dictionary. **Sue Crowe** made a companion to our swatch sample in the round and now has a pair of wristlets. **Lorraine Ehrlinger** made her swatch into a little glasses' case. I've used one of the sample stitches on a hat and I'm still thinking how to do it on a pair of socks, especially since it doesn't change the gauge.

Sunday was two half day classes: the morning was Colorful Cables and the afternoon Colorful Cast-Ons. In the morning we worked flat swatches with different kinds of cables. This is a great way to add one or lots of color to a project. **Debbie Hajzak's** little hat showed how cute it could be with lots of colors, each cable being two different colors and helping to use up lots of little scraps.

The afternoon class was about cast-ons, fun ways to use color to a start a project. You could introduce colors early on that would be used later, such as a

bit of a colorful start for a Lopi style yoked sweater. While I know most of the cast-ons, I was interested to learn how to add colors to some, like the Channel Islands cast on.

Even if you are familiar with some of the information, you can always learn something from these classes. If you haven't tried one of our instructor weekends, I hope you will give it a try next time. You'll have fun with knitting friends and you just might learn something new!

## Yarn Shop Review: Looped Out in London!

Knitting, crocheting and "making" is certainly thriving in the United Kingdom! London has an annual yarn crawl, typically in the late spring. Guides have been published and are available online or in London's yarn shops. There is an annual yarn festival in Edinburgh as one fellow Raveler shared with me a while back. There are fiber tours in Ireland, Scotland and England; I'm sure many of you have seen these in various magazines.

Of course Rowan Yarns has an international presence but even more so in England with its workshops. If you search the Ravelry groups, you will find many knitting communities.

I was in London last December for 7 days. My three major priorities were to visit Tower of London, the Victoria and Albert Museum and of course one of the local yarn shops.

Loop London has an online presence and the one yarn shop I planned to visit. The yarn shop is located in a very charming pedestrian mews filled with flea markets, shops and cafes in the district of Islington. The shop is about 15 years old and moved to the Camden area about 8 years ago. The shop is about a three-minute walk from the Angel Tube station.

The storefront is artsy and beckoning. You walk up; open the front door and find yourself surrounded by a bohemian world filled with yarns, projects and books. I was grateful I had the time to explore those layers of projects, yarns and books, and especially the exotic yarns.

There are two floors with walls of cubbies stuffed with skeins. There are the yarns familiar to many of us in the USA (MadelineTosh, Qing, Quince and Co.); special yarns from Europe (LaBien Aimee, Wollmeise) and some unique yarns available only in Loop. The first floor is mainly lighter weight sock and lace yarns. The second floor encompasses the heavier weight yarns. There are books everywhere and Loop does publish its own patterns. There is a lovely couch area and a communal table where knitters gather for knit night on Thursdays from 5:30PM to 7:30PM.

There are some exquisite scarves by Sophi Dugard. These are crocheted in very fine wools, expensive but the workmanship is worth the cost. As a crocheter, I was inspired by the unusual bohemian designs that I have not seen anywhere else.

There are some lovely yarns by CaMaRose, a Danish designer. Another Danish yarn called Mehlsen yarns are mini skeins in organic wool were beckoning in a Crayola assortment of soft colors- all dyed naturally. The crochet shawl kit made from the yarn is exquisite! These yarns and designs are available only at Loop, but can be purchased online.

I purchased a book called the Mini Yarn Guide London, published based on the annual yarn crawl held in September. The book will be a lovely companion piece to my Stitching up Paris book from my other travels! A skein of MadTosh



sock yarn in a speckled gray will complete a collection of sock yarns that I have been collecting for a future pullover. I was unable to resist some Mehlsen mini skeins; hand dyed using natural dyes by a Danish artisan.

Go online and see the assortment! If you want to yield to temptation, let me know and we can organize a group order!
